

### Following in her footsteps

Many biographers are fond of adventures that allow them to follow in their subject's footsteps.


That's exactly what I did this spring when I went overseas to complete research in the UK for my joint biography of Australian feminist Bessie Rischbieth and her sister Olive Evans.

Alongside uncovering valuable material in the archives, I was able to retrace some parts of Bessie's own journeys overseas. I found the buildings in which she lived in wartime London, visited her spiritual retreat in Glastonbury and even recreated an image from her photo collection in front of the Parthenon in Athens (see left).

#### Reaching future historians





Each month we highlight a new addition to the Australian Dictionary of Biography.


