#### The Nan Phillips Library

Last year the team set out to rename the ADB Library after a woman who had contributed to the ADB but had not yet been publicly recognised. After much research, we selected a candidate: Nancy (Nan) Phillips (née Wearne).

Phillips joined the ANU History Department in 1961 as a departmental assistant. With Professor Douglas Pike, she helped establish the infant ADB, and in 1963 became a full-time ADB administrator and research assistant. She has been credited as the organising force behind the ADB's formidable early reference and filing system and the author of its first style manual.


